BRAINDUST

Have a couple of months to catch up on. First, the Derek Weidman demo was amazing. He turned a Moose head from a chunk of holly. Most demos try to show you how to get proper clean cuts. This was not that kind of demo. I do not think he sharpened once, no sanding, and the rough texture was actually part of the design. Derek used at least 10 different axes to get the moose shope. The blank was so off balance I have no idea how it stayed on the lathe. It was a great lesson on off axis turning and envisioning what an off center cut will do to the design. It was recorded, so I hope I can point to the video at some point.

I am excited about the March meeting. It will be at Homestead woodworking school. Marcel Durette will give a class on 7 cuts with a bowl gouge. Marcel is a great teacher. We will have access to 10+ lathes so everyone should be able to try the different cuts and get some personal tutoring either from Marcel or some of the other club members. I have been thinking on ways to make our demos more interactive, and this seems like a great way to accomplish that. If it goes well, hopefully we can make it an annual event. And, thanks to Annamarie's hard work, we received an education grant from the **Guild of NH Woodworkers**, so there is no cost to the club.

Via 101: Take 101 to Exit 7 (125 N): Proceed on 125 N 2.4 miles and make a Right on Route 87. After 3 Miles, turn left onto Bald Hill Road. The school is 1.1 miles on the left. https://goo.gl/maps/SPvpTgX3ZmK2

From Woodcraft: Take Rt 4 West to Rt 108 South in Durham. Turn Slight Right on Rt 152/Main St. in Newmarket. Go past the high school and turn left onto Grant Road. After 3.5 miles turn left on Bald Hill Road. The school is 0.5 miles on the right.
